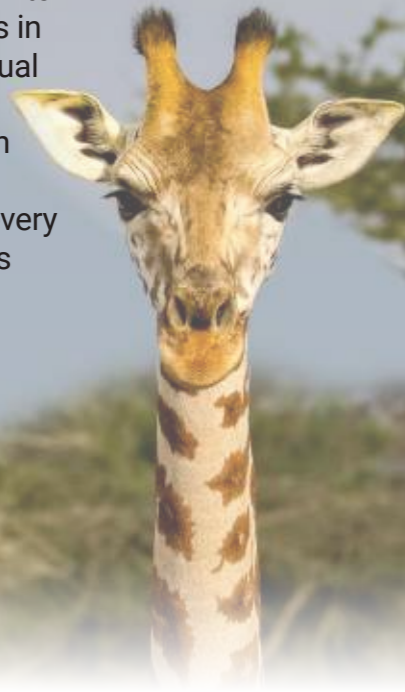


### Uganda supports the largest known populations of critically endangered Nubian giraffe (*Giraffa camelopardalis camelopardalis*).

Since 2013, the Giraffe Conservation Foundation (GCF) has partnered with the Uganda Wildlife Authority (UWA) to monitor and conserve these globally significant Nubian giraffe populations.

Through a series of ambitious conservation translocations, UWA and GCF have expanded the range of Nubian giraffe in the country from only two populations in 2014 to five populations today and effectively increased and augmented their range by >1.5 million acres in the country.

GCF continues to monitor all giraffe populations in Uganda using individual based photographic surveys, which rely on pattern recognition software to identify every surveyed giraffe by its unique spot pattern.



The UWA-GCF mobile veterinary unit in Murchison Falls National Park continues to de-snare wildlife and to undertake regular snare sweeps, community education and outreach together with Snares2Wares.

These targeted conservation efforts have collectively contributed to an increased giraffe population in the country year-on-year.

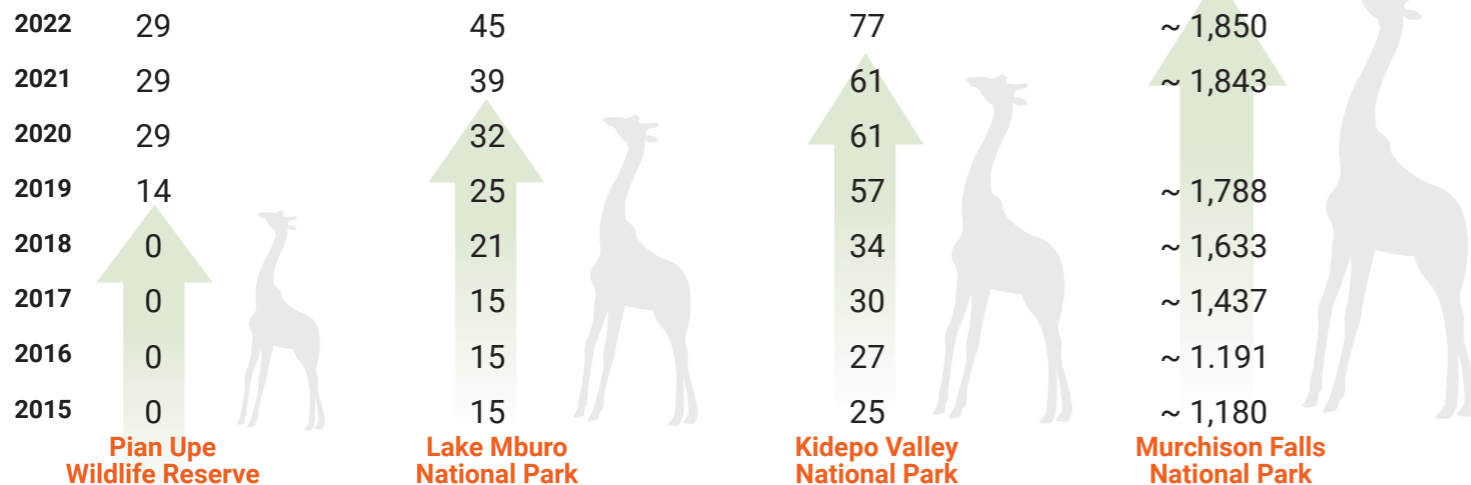

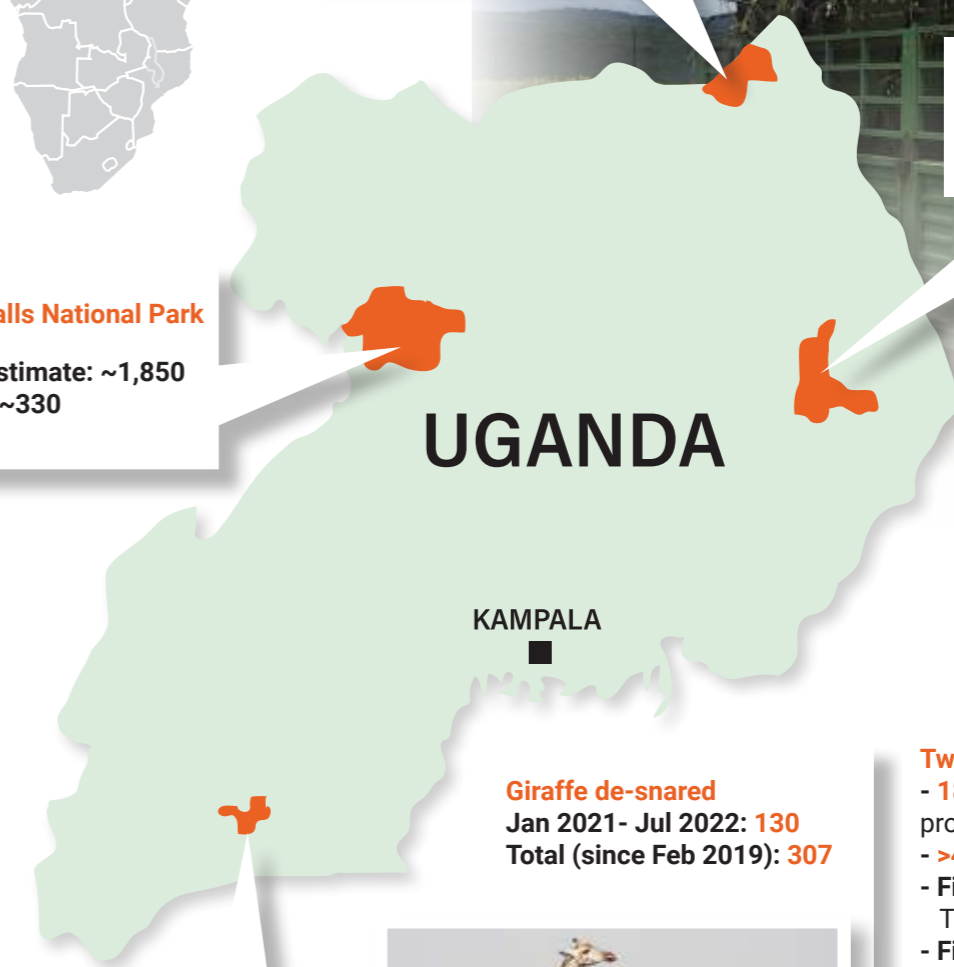
